#### FORT ASSINIBOINE SCHOOL PARENT COUNCIL MINUTES

#### **DECEMBER 9, 2021, 7:00PM-930PM**

#### Nominations for this meeting:

- Interim Chairperson Roxanne Cross called the meeting to order at 7:02pm
- Interim Secretary Jenny Kuelken to record Meeting Minutes.

Welcome to our Woodlands County Representative, Councillor Peter Kuelken.

- Approval of Agenda
  - Christine approved the agenda.
  - Crystal seconded it.
- 2. Approval of minutes from Sep 29, 2021
  - Roxanne motioned to have Minutes reviewed within 10 business days (due Dec 24, 2021) and if no discrepancies are received, approval will be granted. All in favour.

#### 3. Old Business

- a. Programming Committee
  - Tara McQueen was appointed as Parent Society Rep. Mr. Wyman is the teacher rep. Still require Parent Council rep.
- b. Parent Power School portal and online forms.
  - Still 36 families not registered for Power School. Please offer assistance to those who need it. Some parents have chosen not to sign up due to lack of technology, internet, etc. Some parents had accounts created for them and are questioning the security of the payment plans, etc. Is paper completely out of the question? Lorna will follow-up with Melanie, the Power School contact.
- c. Swimming/Bowling programs
  - Swimming was possibly an option this past fall. Unfortunately, it didn't work out for that season due to
    time constraints and already prepared education plans. Swimming lessons in the past were always in
    the Spring. We will revisit this in late January/February. Jenny K. to work with Lorna to facilitate a
    Spring session. Few options include Barrhead pool and Swan Hills pool. Bowling will also be revisited.
    Questioned whether bowling should be considered as curriculum or extra curricular due to the time
    commitment to and from Barrhead, busing, etc.
- d. Need for school front door to be locked
  - Front door of school is locked for the safety of those inside. Lorna stated a doorbell will be added to the main entrance doors. Mrs. Fleming will be getting a new and improved headset with better reception. Parents would like to see doors unlocked. Possibly during recesses and lunch? Possibly just the front door? Mrs. Senger added that once the doors are unlocked during recesses/lunch, it becomes difficult as a Supervisor to monitor and keep track of the whereabouts of all students. Parent concerns about students needing to get in the building in an emergency. Suggestion to have main door (by office) unlocked and the second entrance doors locked instead. Lorna to look into this further.

#### 4. New Business

- a. Pembina Hills PAT results and Diplomas
  - Tabled to next year as no results this year. Exams were not written.
- b. School Council
  - No new members. Therefore, no need to send to Superintendents Executive Assistant.

- c. Student IPP Forms 5-27
  - All students' parents have been contacted on an individual basis.
- d. Division policy on use of facilities by the larger community AP 70-03
  - Lorna says use is being considered case by case. Consideration of workout room, gymnasium, number of
    people, risk of activity, insurance policies, etc. Cost of rental can also vary based on those
    considerations. Was brought up that the workout room was partially funded by a community grant.
    Jenni would like to know if preschool is permitted in the gym. Lorna will inquire. Anyone interested in
    booking a facility is asked to contact Lorna.
- e. Council of School Council follow-up. Meeting on Nov 30.
  - Crystal listened in on meeting. Advised FAS Council that there is \$500 funding available. Roxanne to
    further inquire about this to Charlotte, Assistant to the Superintendent. What can we use \$500 for?
    How do we get approved?
- f. Christmas events
  - See Principals Report.
- g. Annual Satisfaction Surveys
  - Were sent out last week by PHSD.
- h. Communication with Parents/Public
  - Consistent and reliable communication is lacking. Parents are frustrated with the inconsistency and lack of. Suggestion to survey parents with preferred ways to be engaged and notified (various digital options versus paper). Lorna to send a paper poll home with students hoping to get good feedback.
  - Parent comment about the lack of communication and consultation in the draft stages of the AP 20-07, Workplace Health and Safety: COVID-19 Hazard Control Vaccination Status. There was mention at the Nov 24 meeting with the Superintendents that community volunteers were consulted prior to finalizing this AP and yet no community member can confirm this. This is a clear example of the need for better communication.
  - Parent comment about the ice day we had last week. Buses were not in service. Parents dropped students off and there was no supervision on the playground. Lorna confirmed that morning was hectic and was rare. Staff were dealing with road conditions, etc. Lorna will add a notice to the next communication to inform parents to use the main office doors to drop off students for any future occasions where a Supervisor is not on the playground.
- i. Technology Use in Classrooms
  - Parent concerns with type of technology, time utilized, programs utilized. Mrs. Nelson confirmed that
    she has yet to use technology with her students and it has been 3 months of school. Lorna confirmed
    technology use is part of the curriculum. Parents are urged to discuss this technology use directly with
    their teachers. Some have and are not getting responses. Lorna will further investigate.
  - Was noted that parents may just need more information on what programs and how long and when technology will be used. Parents would like to see more communication about this.
- j. School Council grant funding from province
  - See above e. Council of School Council follow-up, meeting Nov 30.


- a. Parent Society Crystal Wood

### **Programming Update**

#### Literacy

Our grade 1-5 students and staff have been cruising along in the world of phonics and making some fantastic progress. Our lead literacy teacher, Mrs. Heather Senger, has led our elementary staff in purchasing excellent resources and implementing regular and intervention programming. Students will be re-tested in January to measure improvement in word recognition, phonemic awareness, and comprehension skills.

We are in the process of hiring a 0.2 FTE teacher to assist with <u>Literacy Support</u> in Gr. 1&2. This works out to approximately 5 hours of additional teaching support each week. The funding for this position is provided by a Learning Loss government grant that PHSD applied for. The position will run from Nov. 29 to the end of the school year. UPDATE as of Dec. 13 - Mrs. Kiselyk will increasing her time by 0.2 and helping with literacy in grade 2&3 on Mondays & Wednesdays.



The single biggest predictor of high academic achievement is reading to children.

Not flash cards, not workbooks, not fancy preschools, not blinking toys or computers, but mom or dad taking the time every day or night (or both!) to sit and read them wonderful books.

Current options for Gr. 6-9 are Coding, Handbells, Art, and Tech Challenge

- <u>Future options include:</u> First Aid with Doris Kuelken, Sewing/Knitting with Mrs. Senger & Seniors, Winter Outdoor Education with Mrs. Kiselyk, and our Parent Programming committee is currently recruiting volunteers for archery and cooking classes.
- Gr. 6-9 students are participating in a half day workshop from <u>Alberta Boreal Forest</u>
   <u>Careers Project</u> on December 8th.

Students will learn about healthy aquatic ecosystems, environmental stewardship and fisheries stocking before releasing their fry into a provincially approved waterbody.
